Build the portfolio before polishing the prose

Your Work/Activities section is not fifteen miniature personal statements. It is a curated evidence set: what you chose to do, how you contributed, what changed, and what the reader should understand about you.

1. Inventory

What you will finish

- A master experience inventory.
- A deliberate set of up to 15 entries.

What this guide cannot promise

No activity list guarantees an interview. Admissions decisions are holistic and school-specific. This system helps you present your actual record clearly; it cannot replace missing experiences or turn routine participation into impact.

One rule for the entire process

Do not write to sound impressive. Write so that a skeptical reader can see what you did, why it mattered, and how you know.

Know the rules before writing

For the 2027 AMCAS cycle, the section is structured enough that administrative mistakes can weaken otherwise strong writing.

Rule	What it means for your workflow
Significant experiences only	Quality matters more than filling all 15 slots.
Plain text reaches schools	Bold, bullets, and indentation cannot carry structure.
Chronological display	You cannot create an intended reading order.
Up to four date ranges	Recurring participation can stay in one entry.
Completed vs. anticipated hours	Report what is done separately from what is planned.
Locked after original submission	Resolve facts and proofread before you certify.

Most Meaningful rule: if you enter two or more experiences, AMCAS requires at least one Most Meaningful designation. You may select up to three.

What counts toward the character limit?

Characters include spaces and punctuation. Draft in plain text, paste into the application, and confirm the application's own counter. Do not rely on a word count.

Every entry should add new evidence

Reviewers may sort entries differently. Your section therefore needs to work both as a portfolio and as fifteen independent records.

A useful entry answers four questions

1. **Where were you?** Give only the context needed to understand the role.
2. **What did you do?** Name your actions, decisions, and scope.
3. **What changed?** Show a result, consequence, or learning edge.
4. **Why does it belong?** Add evidence not already clear elsewhere.

The portfolio test

Cover every title and date. If the descriptions disappeared, your application would still show participation. The descriptions must supply what the fields cannot: contribution, judgment, development, and context.

Five evidence functions

Exposure

You understand a setting, population, or role.

Contribution

Your work changed something beyond your own resume.

Growth

You revised a belief, skill, or behavior.

Capacity

You sustained responsibility or handled complexity.

Dimension

The reader sees a genuine interest, identity, or life context.

After reading my section, I want a reviewer to be able to say:

Recall broadly before you select narrowly

Starting with your “best” activities invites prestige bias. First recover everything that carried responsibility, curiosity, service, or sustained effort.

Search every domain

- Paid jobs, including nonclinical work.
- Clinical employment and volunteering.
- Research, posters, publications, and conferences.
- Community service and advocacy.
- Teaching, tutoring, and mentorship.
- Leadership and team roles.
- Athletics, arts, hobbies, and caregiving.
- Honors, scholarships, and recognition.
- Military service and structured programs.

Recover hidden evidence

Search calendars, resumes, pay records, lab notebooks, email, award notices, and old applications. The goal is not to include everything. It is to keep memory from deciding for you.

Privacy note: record private facts in your own secure working file. Do not paste patient-identifying or confidential information into drafting tools.

Experience	Dates / hours	My contribution	What changed

Do not discard ordinary work. A restaurant, retail, factory, caregiving, or campus job may demonstrate reliability, conflict management, communication, and financial context better than another short premed activity.
