Rehearse decisions, not speeches

The goal is not to memorize perfect answers. It is to know your evidence, think in a visible structure, and stay present when the question is unfamiliar.

The promise

By the end, you will have an interview brief, an eight-story bank, school-specific talking points, two mock-interview plans, and a one-page day-of sheet.

The boundary

No framework can guarantee admission. School formats and policies vary; your invitation and the school's current instructions control.

Use the preparation loop

1. **Say every answer aloud.** Silent preparation hides pacing, jargon, and missing transitions.
2. **Practice with variation.** Ask the same competency through different prompts so you learn to adapt rather than recite.
3. **Review behavior, not vibes.** Score evidence, structure, listening, and reflection. "I felt awkward" is not a useful metric.
4. **Protect authenticity.** Use examples that are yours. Do not invent details, patients, outcomes, or responsibilities.

Prepared does not mean polished flat. A strong answer has structure, but it still sounds like you are discovering the wording in real time.

The interview tests how you think with other people

An invitation means the school already sees potential in the application. The interview adds evidence that is hard to capture on paper: communication, judgment, self-awareness, professionalism, and mutual fit.

What interviewers can observe

- Whether you answer the question asked.
- How you organize incomplete information.
- Whether you can name competing perspectives.
- How you discuss mistakes and feedback.
- Whether your motivation matches your record.
- How you treat everyone in the process.

What you are not expected to be

- A practicing clinician.
- A health-policy expert.
- Perfectly certain.
- Free of weaknesses or setbacks.
- Equally knowledgeable about every school.
- Identical to a rehearsed “ideal applicant.”

Translate competencies into evidence

Competency family	What sounds credible	What feels thin
Service and empathy	Needs noticed; action adjusted	“I like helping people”
Teamwork	Role, friction, repair	Everyone agreed
Learning and growth	Feedback changed behavior	Perfection claim
Ethical responsibility	Tradeoffs named; duty owned	Instant certainty
Communication	Clear, responsive, specific	Speech detached from prompt

The AAMC publishes premed competencies used as a framework for holistic review. Individual schools choose their own process and emphasis.

Prepare for the room you are entering

The same applicant can perform differently across formats. Confirm the structure from the invitation instead of relying on prior-year reports.

Format	What changes	Preparation priority
Traditional	Longer conversation	Narrative depth; follow-ups
Panel	Multiple perspectives	Inclusive eye contact; concise answers
MMI	Timed stations	Fast structure; reset skill
Hybrid	Several modes	Switching gears
Live virtual	Screen-mediated cues	Technology; camera presence
Asynchronous	No live interviewer	Prompt timing; concise delivery

Open or closed file

Ask whether interviewers have read your application if the school tells you. Never assume. In a closed-file setting, give enough context for the story to stand alone.

Structured or conversational

Structured interviews may use standardized prompts and scoring. Conversational interviews can still evaluate defined competencies.

My confirmed format, timing, platform, and contact:

Formats can change between cycles. Use the school's current invitation, portal, and admissions office as the final authority.

Know the file before defending the candidacy

Your interview is not a new application. It is a live interpretation of the one you already submitted.

Read every submitted item

- ☐ Primary application and personal statement
- ☐ Work and Activities entries
- ☐ Most Meaningful essays
- ☐ Secondary essays for this school
- ☐ Updates already sent
- ☐ Transcript anomalies or timeline gaps

Mark four things

Claims: What did you say matters?

Evidence: What proves it?

Transitions: What could invite questions?

Growth: What has changed since submission?

The consistency grid

Application claim	Example I can discuss	What I learned

Do not “upgrade” your past. If your understanding evolved after submission, say so directly: “At the time I framed it this way; since then, I have come to see...”
